Teaching About Evidence-Based Practice MLA CE credits – 8 contact hours Instructor: Lisa Traditi

Description:

This course will provide participants with the information necessary to start or improve their classes on searching the literature for the evidence and applying evidence to health sciences practice. Participants will explore the librarian's role in evidence-based practice (EBP), develop learning exercises using evidence-based database resources, explore and develop methods for integrating EBP into the curricula of health sciences programs, and leave with planning and marketing tips for their evidence-based health care instruction. Screencasting: Creating Online Tutorials
MLA CE credit – 4 contact hours
Instructor: Alison Aldrich

Description:

Building on concepts of understanding learning styles and how to organize and 'chunk' instructional content for the online environment, this course's main goal is to teach librarians best practices for creating effective screencasts (video-based online instruction modules) using Camtasia Studio and other similar tools. Student learning outcomes for this full-day, face-to-face workshop include: the ability to determine how to get the most from your screencasts; learning how to divide content into logical chunks that are most appropriate for online learners; an understanding of best practices for creating content for your topic (e.g. storyboarding, script writing, and voiceover/narration); an understanding of what hardware and software tools work best for which content (and best sources for acquiring needed tools); and the ability to assess the effectiveness of screencasted content.

William E. Welton, DrPH, MHA

Dr. Welton currently serves as the Program Director of the Master's in Health Administration Program at the University of Washington in Seattle, WA. Prior to joining the UW faculty in 2001, Dr. Welton founded and developed the School of Public Health at MCP Hahnemann University in Philadelphia, PA during the period 1994-2000. Dr. Welton

simultaneously received his DrPH degree in Health Policy from the University of Michigan in 1999. From 1972-1994, Dr. Welton served in a variety of senior operational management and executive leadership roles in several of the nation's leading health systems and academic medical centers, including the Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital (a component of the Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center in Hanover, NH from 1979–1988) and the Allegheny Health, Education and Research Foundation (Philadelphia, Pa from 1988–2000).

"Is There A Role for Medical Librarians to Play in Reforming the Nation's Healthcare System?"

Over the next decade the U.S. health system is projected to undergo significant change resulting from a systemic restructuring of relationships and incentives affecting insurers, hospitals, physicians, patients, families and community citizens in fundamental ways. Any revised system is likely to place even heavier emphasis on market-based activities rewarding improvements in quality and efficiency, reductions in risk and injury, and improved information flow to clinicians, organizational executives, patients, and communities.

The medical library community will be challenged within any new environment to determine who will need what kind of information, how it can best be provided to support organizational and systemic change objectives, to whom and in what form must it be provided to improve the competitive effectiveness of hospital and clinical providers, and what information can be provided to patients and families to assist them in making better and more informed decisions about diagnostic and treatment strategies to improve outcomes, thus assisting them in managing medical care and personal financial risk?

Important questions will be: Is there a role for medical librarians in this 'brave new world? If so, what is the librarian role, which audiences have what needs, what are critical resource requirements, and how can medical librarians connect relevant information to relevant audiences?

LibGuides is Web 2.0 Goodness at Its Best - Kathy Murray

Looking for an easy, clean, web-accessible way to present your services, resources, and tips via the web? Interested in a simple way to advertise new books, provide library updates or medical news flashes to Twitter, pull in RSS feeds from Google Reader or Delicious, or chat with your users in real time? Are you at the bottom of the list to get IT time to update your website?

This talk will cover the basics of LibGuides from Springshare. LibGuides is a hosted service of online subject guides. No html coding or other IT experience is needed. Find a guide you like and copy it (totally acceptable behavior) or begin from scratch. Guides are two or three columns of boxes. A box contains different types of information: streaming videos, RSS fees, lists and links, free text, etc. Often called "subject guides", this terminology is too limiting and has a definite academic library history. However, linking to databases and favorite Websites by subject is just so easyl LibGuides are so customizable – add your header and footer, choose your colors, and pick how many columns and what type of boxes you want on each guide. Is this something we should be considering for a Group Purchasing option?
